18 **PARTIES**

19 1. Kristin Walker (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as  
20 the Executive Officer of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners (Board), Department of Consumer  
21 Affairs.

22 2. On or about January 27, 1989, Board issued Chiropractor License Number DC 19403  
23 to Wayne Scott Carr (Respondent). The Chiropractor License was in full force and effect at all  
24 times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on July 31, 2025, unless renewed.

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1 **JURISDICTION**

2 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board, under the authority of the following  
3 sections of the Chiropractic Act (Act).<sup>1</sup> The Board's regulations, and the Business and  
4 Professions Code.

5 4. Section 10 of the Act states, in pertinent part, that the Board may suspend or revoke a  
6 license to practice chiropractic or may place the license on probation for violations of the rules  
7 and regulations adopted by the Board or for any cause specified in the Chiropractic Initiative Act.

8 5. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 372 states:

9 The suspension, expiration, or forfeiture by operation of law of a license issued  
10 by the board, or its suspension, or forfeiture by order of the board or by order of a  
11 court of law, or its surrender without the written consent of the board shall not, during  
12 any period in which it may be renewed, restored, reissued, or reinstated, deprive the  
13 board of its authority to institute or continue a disciplinary proceeding against the  
14 licensee upon any ground provided by law or to enter an order suspending or  
15 revoking the license or otherwise taking disciplinary action against the licensee on  
16 any such ground.

14 **STATUTORY PROVISIONS**

15 6. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 317, states, in pertinent part:

16 The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of  
17 unprofessional conduct which has been brought to its attention, or whose license has  
18 been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake.

18 Unprofessional conduct includes, but is not limited to, the following:

19 . . .

20 (m) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or  
21 abetting in the violation of, or conspiring to violate any provision or term of the Act  
22 or the regulations adopted by the board thereunder;

28 1922, while not included in the Business and Professions Code by the legislature, is set out in  
West's Annotated California Codes as sections 1000-1 to 1000-19, and is included in Deering's  
California Codes as Appendix I, for convenient reference.

1 7. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 316 states, in pertinent part:

2 . . .

3 (c) The commission of any act of sexual abuse, sexual misconduct, or sexual  
4 relations by a licensee with a patient, client, customer or employee is unprofessional  
5 conduct and cause for disciplinary action. This conduct is substantially related to the  
6 qualifications, functions, or duties of a chiropractic license.

6 . . .

7 8. Business and Professions Code section 726 states, in pertinent part:

8 (a) The commission of any act of sexual abuse, misconduct, or relations with a  
9 patient, client, or customer constitutes unprofessional conduct and grounds for  
10 disciplinary action for any person licensed under this division or under any initiative  
11 act referred to in this division.

11 . . .

### 12 **COST RECOVERY**

13 9. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 317.5, subdivision (a), states, in  
14 pertinent part, that the Board may request that the administrative law judge to direct a licensee  
15 found to have committed a violation or violations of the Act to pay a sum not to exceed the  
16 reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

### 18 **CAUSE OF DISCIPLINE**

19 (Unprofessional Conduct and/or Sexual Misconduct)

20 10. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 10 of the Act and under  
21 California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 317(m) and 316(c), and/or Business and  
22 Professions Code section 726(a) for unprofessional conduct. Respondent engaged in  
23 unprofessional conduct and/or sexual abuse and/or sexual misconduct during his chiropractic  
24 treatment of Patient 1, whom he treated from at least July 2020 to June 2023. During his  
25 treatments of Patient 1, Respondent unnecessarily and inappropriately touched her buttocks and  
26 allowed his hand to linger on her buttocks, making Patient 1<sup>2</sup> uncomfortable.

**PRAYER**

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Board of Chiropractic Examiners issue a decision:

1. Revoking or suspending Chiropractor License Number DC 19403, issued to Wayne Scott Carr (Respondent);

2. Ordering Respondent to pay the Board of Chiropractic Examiners the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Title 16, California Code of Regulations, section 317.5 and if placed on probation, the costs of probation monitoring;

and,

3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
